September 14th Presentation Steve Sinner



Master Woodturner, Steve Sinner, will be the speaker for the September 14 Chapter meeting. Steve will discuss his technique for turning vases and explain the method he uses to add outstanding artwork on finished vases. Steve was the judge for the Woodturning entries in the Iowa State Fair this year. He will provide commentary on items entered in the fair. Be sure to bring to our Chapter meeting any entry you had at the Fair so that it can be included in his review.

Sources of inspiration for Steve's turnings often come from unexpected places. A tree downed by a summer storm, or perhaps a log provided by a friend. Steve sources his wood from such instances of chance and through friends

who know he will appreciate the material. The individual qualities found in a piece of wood are essential to the woodturning process. Whether it is the straight-grained and dense sugar maple or the delicately colored walnut, Sinner transforms the raw beauty of wood into elegant works of art. Born in Omaha, Nebraska, in 1942, Sinner had an early interest in craft. "As far back as I can remember, the process of making has fascinated me...."This affinity evolved into a lifetime of making, through a career in the manufacturing industry and later as a master woodturner. In the basement of Sinner's childhood home, he created everything from chess pieces to wooden scooters. While in school, shop class furthered his interest and, after college, Sinner made furniture and clocks and experimented with woodcarving. It was not until the 1980s that he seriously pursued lathe-turned objects. Sinner credits Creative Woodturning, written in 1975 by Dale Nish (1932-2013), with igniting his passion for woodturning. Nish was an influential mentor for an entire generation of woodturners, and his book remains an important quide for beginners and experts alike. After earning a degree in industrial education from Iowa State University, Sinner worked in manufacturing for decades. As he stated, "My work and interests in manufacturing are often reflected in my work. You can see repetition, precision, and quality. The process of taking a raw material and transforming it into a finished product is a consistent thread in Sinner's life story.

Sinner is a master at hollowing deep vessels. He created his own tools in order to achieve more precise hollowing. That evolved into a business: Advanced Lathe Tools, LLC. His hollowing bars use a laser monitoring system for consistent wall thickness.

2024 Iowa State Fair Recap Part 1 (Setting Up) By Tom Whalley

This year's state fair booth was another success. There are so many people to thank and recognize for helping make it happen but first, what actually goes into doing this each year? Here's a look at all the activities that contribute to making this event happen:

- Establish the product list (this year we had about 50 different items to sell)
- Set targets for the numbers of items we anticipate needing
- Purchase wood for spurtles, rolling pins, tops, etc..
- Cut wood into blanks
- Manage inventory of blanks for all the different projects
- Track how many blanks are taken out and returned
- Make all the items we sell at the fair this is a huge one!
- Present updates to the board on inventory returned on a monthly basis
- Store all the blanks and finished pieces
- Purchase water, soft drinks, and paper towels to be used at the fair.
- Load everything from our meeting space into a trailers to take to the fair (thanks to Dennis Anderson for the use of his trailer)
- Load the two lathes and the toolbox from the training center to take to the fair (thanks to Dan England for the use of his trailer)
- Move everything into the space at the Cultural Center.
- Set up the booth tables, shelves, etc.
- Cover the tables with the white paper
- Install all the skirting around the tables
- Get the TV and camera set up for folks to see what is being turned
- Set up our Des Moines Woodturners sign (Thanks to Dan England for creating the frame for this)
- Price everything
- Update all the pricing cards we place on the tables near the appropriate items
- Set up the products we sell on the tables and get the pricing information in place
- At the end of the fair, pack up everything to take back to the mall or the training center
- This large group of members (plus a couple of wives of members) were responsible for the huge success we had this year.
- Inventory what was brought back to the mall to get ready for next year.

2024 Iowa State Fair Recap Part 2 (At the Fair)

We had booth coordinators, salespeople, and demonstrators. Also, tickets for entry had to be purchased and parking passes had to be gotten. They either had to be passed out or mailed. Additionally, all the additional information about times, locations, etc., had to be printed and included in the envelopes with the tickets and parking passes. This is a massive coordination process. This year we had a couple of folks who were not able to be at the booth, so at the last minute, fill-ins had to be recruited.

For 2024, we had 36 members volunteer to work at the booth. Then you add all the people that assisted with the activities listed above, including those who took blanks home to turn into items we sold at the booth and that number becomes much larger.

2024 Iowa State Fair Recap Part 3 (Special Thanks)

Five members went above and beyond to make it happen.

- Stan Merrell and Tom Baker were there every day from about 6:00 AM to closing time at 8:00 PM handling the money and helping out on the sales desk. After he got home from the fair (every day), Stan would reconcile the funds and print out a spreadsheet detailing the sales of each item sold that day. Tom assisted Stan at the treasures table.
- **Dan Carlson** and **Dick Meuler** were a tag team that solicited workers, prepared schedules, procured admittance and parking passes, assembled and distributed worker packets with need-to-know information, admittance tickets, and parking passes.
- **Duane Groenenboom** managed wood inventories, checked out blanks, checked in finished items, and developed a new system of tracking what was taken out and received.
- To all of you who helped in any way with making this experience happen, a huge thank you! Without the time you volunteered to do this, none of this would have happened.

2024 Iowa State Fair Recap Part 4 (Why do we do this?)

Why do we do this year after year?To show the public the art of woodturning. Wood items are not just craft show items, but a form of art. By doing live demonstrations every day, people who had no idea how things were made can see firsthand what this process is.

The items that we turn are designed to improve the skill set for members such as rounding the ends of spurtles and rolling pins, turning straight smooth surfaces for rolling pins and spurtles, perfecting the skills of bowl turning to eliminate sanding or finish rings, and the bumps we see on the inside bottoms of bowls. The revenue we generate allows us to provide demonstrations by professional turners at no additional costs to the members and to keep our dues at perhaps the lowest of any Chapter in the AAW.

Working in the booth with other members that we have not met yet or gotten to know very well is rewarding. Lasting friendships come out of this experience. Monthly meetings or networking meetings often don't allow us to get to know people like working side by side with them at the fair does.

If you have never participated in the state fair effort or if you are a newer member, please consider helping in some way for the fair next year. We have blanks for spurtles and rolling pins so you can start making items we sell now. As you can see, there are also a lot of "behind the scenes" activities that are available.

Des Moines Woodturners Woodturning Scholarship

The Des Moines Woodturners offer a scholarship program for the benefit of chapter members. Woodturning can be an expensive endeavor. The cost of equipment such as a lathe, bandsaw, chainsaw, sharpening system, buffing system and the myriad of items like drive centers, scroll chucks, live centers, adapters, jaws, and faceplates can mount rapidly. In addition is the cost of turning tools, embellishing tools, specialty tools and a host of accessories, supplies and finishing products, not to mention the cost of wood if you don't have the capacity to harvest your own.

By the same token, three and five day woodturning educational events are also expensive when located out-of-state. Travel costs, lodging and tuition can easily run \$1,000 to \$1,700 per event.

This scholarship is not intended as a source of financial aid for those who might otherwise not be able to afford the educational experience. Instead, it is offered as an incentive to those serious about woodturning who are willing to expand their skills and knowledge and bring those skill-sets back to share with our members in a variety of ways. The scholarship can provide recipients a 25% to 50% discount toward the overall cost of their attendance expenses.

The purpose of the scholarship is to expand personal woodturning skills and knowledge and share their experience with fellow members by:

- -Attending Chapter events and sharing their learning experience.
- -Showing examples of their work as a result of their learning experience.
- -Demonstrating what they learned at a chapter meeting, event, or class.
- -Sharing their overall learning experience and confidence building experience.
- -Encouraging members to expand their woodturning skills via similar educational experiences.
- -Volunteering for Chapter leadership positions (wide variety of opportunities).

Matt Monaco Demonstration Summary By Will Zitterich

Matt Monaco's morning demonstration was on using the skew and making captured rings. He is a professional turner and provides turning classes at his studio near Springfield Missouri. He has been a production turner making many copies of the same bowl.

He began with a 3-inch square ash blank and demonstrated how to make a goblet with captured rings on the stem. He made the square blank round with a planing cut with the skew beginning at each end. He demonstrated a catch and showed how they occur and how to avoid them. He was turning the blank at 1500-2000 rpm and the catch gouged out the wood to almost making the blank unusable. He made the planing cut by leading with the short point of the skew. The planing cut is made using the tool support and the peeling cut is made without the support of the tool rest. The "V" groove is made using the large point to make the groove and the sides of the groove is straight. The sides of the V groove are rounded as making a bead with the small point leading the cut. One of his recommendations is to turn the blank faster to get a cleaner cut and will be burnished to about a 320 roughness.

He demonstrated using 1/2 inch skew on a walnut blank. As he planed the blank, he lead the cut to the right with the long point and lead to the left using the short point. He made a top with a captured ring on the stem and finished it with oil.

Matt Monaco's afternoon demonstration began at 1:00 demonstrating how he makes his signature bowls. This would be cross-grain turning as the spindle would be cutting side grain. He used a 10–12-inch wood blank and began at 800-1000 rpm. He has made some of his turning tools as a spear point from a thick scraper and a 45-degree bevel. He uses several other gouges as a bowl gouge with a swept back to cut the tenon on one end. Internal cuts we made with a 3/8-inch bowl gouge with a 40–45-degree bevel with a 50-degree micro bevel and a small swept back side. The gives him a very smooth cut. He thought using a gouge with large swept back wings would not give a smooth cut on the surface. He cut the inside of the bowl at 1500 rpm. He also made and used a spindle gouge with a sharp point as a detail gouge. He finished the inside of the bowl with a 1/4 inch gouge with a 50-degree micro bevel.

Matt ended the demonstration by making a cap for the bowl he just made beginning with a 6-inch diameter blank. He made a cap to fit the bowl edge diameter with a tight fit and then turned the blank to match the bowl edge. The bowl was very impressive with very smooth sides and interior and burnished to about a 320 roughness. Very little sanding is necessary (and may not be even necessary). The bowl was very light with only about 1/8-inch-thick walls.

Basic Woodturning: If you have not taken Basic Woodturning you will find it useful if you're new to turning, been away from the lathe for awhile or would just like a refresher. Enhance your spindle turning skills. It is a fun day and a confidence builder. In addition, it is the prerequisite for the other courses. Basic Woodturning is two consecutive Mondays, 8:30 to 5 and costs \$40.

Basic Bowl Turning: This class touches on basics of wood harvesting, differences from spindle turning, and introduces the bowl gouge. You will

practice on a Poplar blank before turning your Hard Maple bowl. The class is one full day. We provide the tools and blanks, you provide the accessories and face shield. This is a one day class and costs \$20.

Basic Segmenting: This class will cover the basics of making segmented projects, from calculating segment angles and sizes, ring diameters needed, segment wood prep, gluing and clamping, to accurate cutting fixtures. You'll glue together furnished pre-cut segments and clamp them. Turning will be demonstrated but students won't be using the lathe in the class. Pre-cut segments for glue-up practice will be furnished. Bring paper and pencil to take notes. This is a one day class and costs \$20.

Basic Skew Chisel: This class will introduce students to the proper techniques and use of the tool as well as sharpening. Students will furnish their own skew chisel(s) (3/4 inch and up preferred). We will use the same accessories as in the Basic Woodturning Class. This is a one day class and costs \$20.

Basic Sharpening: The sharpening class will use lathe mounted sandpaper sharpening wheels and wooden dowels to teach the techniques of sharpening. This class is primarily for gouges but will also touch on a variety of other common traditional turning tools such as parting tools, skew, bedan and scrapers. In addition, sharpening hollowing tools, thread chasers, hook tools and common flat carbide cutters will be discussed. After practice, students will have the

opportunity to sharpen their own tools using the Oneway Wolverine Sharpening system and CBN wheels. This is a one day class and costs \$20.
