For nearly 60 years, woodworking has been a part of member Tom Whalley's life either as a hobby or as a way to disappear into a world of fascination and creativity. Steve Sinner presentation to DM woodturners Sept 24, 2024 Summary

Steve Sinner is a Master Woodturner and is known as a master in hollowing deep vessels. He has a unique technique for turning vases to create outstanding artwork on finished vases. He created his own tools to achieve more precise hollowing which evolved into a business: Advanced Lathe Tools, LLC. Steve explained that his vases all have a unique shape. He collaborates with a partner on artwork to make sure he is achieving that same shape before he continues turning the vase. He uses sugar maple with straight grain and no knots as the wood of choice for his vases. He can fill in a knot with epoxy is necessary. He put a 6-inch diameter and 12-inch-long piece of maple on the lathe to demonstrate his process. He is careful to make sure the drive center is centered on the pith. In this way the green vase will dry more uniformly. He will turn the vase, hollow it, and coat it in Anchor Seal and hang it upside down to dry. When the moisture content gets below 15 %, he will be able to do the final turning and finishing. If the vase is frozen just before the drying process it will reduce the drying time. He does not monitor the lathe speed but uses the lathe lower range for larger pieces and the higher range for small pieces. He only uses a two-pronged drive center to more effectively attach to a blank with uneven end on the blank. He began by using a large roughing gouge to take oR the bark and turn the blank into a uniform cylinder and then used scrapers to create a dovetail on the drive center end of the cylinder to fit a Vicmarc chuck and create the top of the vase. He is very careful to make the top of the vase flat just below the neck and a fishhook shape on the neck at the bottom of the vase top. He made a raised area on the vase to give the wheels on the center steady a track to run on to minimize discoloration of the wood. He will hollow the vase using a center steady to achieve a uniform thickness to enhance uniform drying. Steve uses all kinds of finishes on his vases. He uses Golden acrylics to paint pieces and fills cracks with epoxy and wood dust. He also uses bronze reacting paints and molding paste. He stipples the surface with an engraver to make the texture. He also adds paint dots and moves them around with blasts of air. The inside of the vase is painted black if the natural color interferes with the base appearance. The finish is Minwax spar urethane Helmsman. Mr. Sinner demonstrated making a small goblet with very thin walls he obtained by shining a light into the goblet as it was being hollowed. A pierced design is also made using an electronic indexing wheel set up on lathe for that purpose. At the end of the end of the demonstration he offered to critique some of the members' pieces. Mr. Sinner was a judge for the turned pieces at the State Fair this year. The critique was on a broad number of topics as shape, color, thickness, style, wood choice, amount of threading, proportions, and the base should not overpower the piece. He also made a point for judged pieces; judges may be reluctant to judge a piece if any other objects are added to the piece. So, enhancements to a piece as flowers, jewelry, or stand may prevent it from being judged. He did offer many complimentary comments about the pieces critiqued.

Update on Judging State Fair Entries from Steve Sinner

I apologize for not making myself clear at the meeting Saturday.

At least one member did not understand that the addition of enhancements to an entry to a juried show is not acceptable; while the same thing is just fine for displaying the work for the show.

For example, if there were a dozen vases entered, all with bouquets of flowers, the floral arrangements would inevitably affect the judgement of the juror. That would be unfair to the makers.

Therefore, the addition of enhancements results in the disqualification of the entry – regardless of how many entries there are.

Add all the jewelry, flowers and whatever you please after the judging.

I hope this helps to clarify the matter.

Also, the piece I turned cracked before we had packed up. Probably even before the demo was over. My failure to bring and apply Anchorseal was the reason for that. I may not have made the point that Anchorseal or an equivalent must be applied as soon as possible, especially to the end grain. Normally, I would apply it as soon as I finished shaping the top portion – before proceeding to shape the rest.

Des Moines Woodturners Woodturning Scholarship

The Des Moines Woodturners offer a scholarship program for the benefit of chapter members. Woodturning can be an expensive endeavor. The cost of equipment such as a lathe, bandsaw, chainsaw, sharpening system, buffing system and the myriad of items like drive centers, scroll chucks, live centers, adapters, jaws, and faceplates can mount rapidly. In addition is the cost of turning tools, embellishing tools, specialty tools and a host of accessories, supplies and finishing products, not to mention the cost of wood if you don't have the capacity to harvest your own.

By the same token, three and five day woodturning educational events are also expensive when located out-of-state. Travel costs, lodging and tuition can easily run \$1,000 to \$1,700 per event.

This scholarship is not intended as a source of financial aid for those who might otherwise not be able to afford the educational experience. Instead, it is offered as an incentive to those serious about woodturning who are willing to expand their skills and knowledge and bring those skill-sets back to share with our members in a variety of ways. The scholarship can provide recipients a 25% to 50% discount toward the overall cost of their attendance expenses.

The purpose of the scholarship is to expand personal woodturning skills and knowledge and share their experience with fellow members by:

-Attending Chapter events and sharing their learning experience.

-Showing examples of their work as a result of their learning experience.

-Demonstrating what they learned at a chapter meeting, event, or class.

-Sharing their overall learning experience and confidence building experience.

-Encouraging members to expand their woodturning skills via similar educational experiences.

-Volunteering for Chapter leadership positions (wide variety of opportunities).

Basic Woodturning: If you have not taken Basic Woodturning you will find it useful if you're new to turning, been away from the lathe for awhile or would just like a refresher. Enhance your spindle turning skills. It is a fun day and a confidence builder. In addition, it is the prerequisite for the other courses. Basic Woodturning is two consecutive Mondays, 8:30 to 5 and costs \$40.

Basic Bowl Turning: This class touches on basics of wood harvesting,

differences from spindle turning, and introduces the bowl gouge. You will practice on a Poplar blank before turning your Hard Maple bowl. The class is one full day. We provide the tools and blanks, you provide the accessories and face shield. This is a one day class and costs \$20.

Basic Segmenting: This class will cover the basics of making segmented projects, from calculating segment angles and sizes, ring diameters needed, segment wood prep, gluing and clamping, to accurate cutting fixtures. You'll glue together furnished pre-cut segments and clamp them. Turning will be demonstrated but students won't be using the lathe in the class. Pre-cut segments for glue-up practice will be furnished. Bring paper and pencil to take notes. This is a one day class and costs \$20.

Basic Skew Chisel: This class will introduce students to the proper techniques and use of the tool as well as sharpening. Students will furnish their own skew chisel(s) (3/4 inch and up preferred). We will use the same accessories as in the Basic Woodturning Class. This is a one day class and costs \$20.

Basic Sharpening: The sharpening class will use lathe mounted sandpaper sharpening wheels and wooden dowels to teach the techniques of sharpening. This class is primarily for gouges

but will also touch on a variety of other common traditional turning tools such as parting tools, skew, bedan and scrapers. In addition, sharpening hollowing tools, thread chasers, hook tools and common flat carbide cutters will be discussed. After practice, students will have the opportunity to sharpen their own tools using the Oneway Wolverine Sharpening system and CBN wheels. This is a one day class and costs \$20.
